Accomplishments in 2011

Hazardous waste put in its place

The big accomplishment for 2011 was the opening of the Devens Regional Household Hazardous Products Collection Center in July. The "Devens HHW" provides a convenient service for the residents of Ayer, Bolton, Devens, Groton, Harvard, Lancaster, Littleton, Lunenburg, and Townsend. Businesses located in these towns that generate less than 220 pounds or 27 gallons of toxic waste per month can also use the service. The facility, located at 9 Cook Street behind the DPW, is open 9a—noon on the first Wednesday and following Saturday of the month, March— December, to collect hazardous products such as oil-based paint, rechargeable batteries, cleaning solvents, fluorescent bulbs, etc.



This expanded service, which was previously offered only twice per year, will minimize the threat that toxic products pose to children, pets, water supplies, and the local environment. Learn more at www.devenshhw.com.

Learning better practices



The EHS Roundtable brought local professionals with environmental, health and safety responsibilities together on a monthly basis to learn about and discuss a range of subjects critical to their profession. Topics included OSHA updates, employer liabilities, and return to work programs. The Compliance University, facilitated by a representative from the State's OTA (Office of Technical Assistance), provided a review of new environmental regulations and helpful resources. Additionally, local professionals interested in green building practices benefited from roundtables on Sustainable Housing at Devens, Building for Water and Energy Efficiency, and Design for Reuse – Sustainable Design and Deconstruction. The Great Exchange facilitated the diversion of an estimated 50 tons of materials that were destined to go to the landfill to reuse opportunities in 2011. In addition to making better use of

resources, the participating 37 businesses, non-profits and municipalities saved over \$25,000 from avoided disposal or purchasing costs. This unique program has repurposed over 400 tons of "treasures" since its launch in 2007.
